The One Ocean Hub is an international programme of **research** for **sustainable development**

building **fair partnerships** between coastal people, researchers, decision-makers, civil society, and international organisations to **value and learn from different knowledge systems and voices**

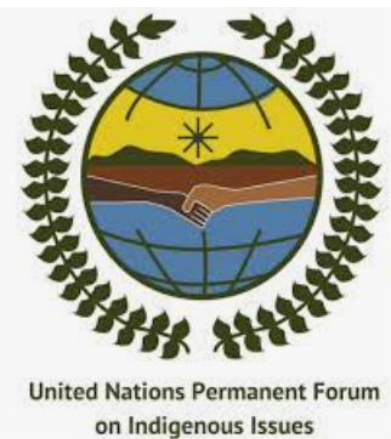
connecting 126 researchers (marine & social sciences, law & arts) from 21 research institutions **in the Global South & North**

- Local and national learning in **Ghana, Namibia, South Africa**
- cross-regional learning (Univ. of **West Indies & South Pacific**)
- local-to-global learning (UN, international and regional organizations, international and local NGOs)

→ **Prototype** of fair research partnership between Global North/South (funded by UK ODA), with funder-set & co-developed **equity criteria** + & **Monitoring, Evaluation & Learning (MEL)** on fairness & sustainable development impact

KEY POINTS

Focusing on inter-connections among all threats to ocean health

Establishing a specific process to ensuring equitable partnerships among researchers and research partners

Understanding what went wrong in previous international ocean research collaborations

Ongoing assessment and learning of lessons on fair partnerships, including institutional responses and resource distribution

Highlighting multiple dimensions of fairness in co-designing and co-delivering research

Allowing sufficient time and opportunities to build friendships

Partnerships and research collaboration that promote **co-developed, co-led and co-published** research
